The Aspen Institute and Colorado State Library Strategies for Using Colorado's Public Libraries to Build More Resilient Communities

The Aspen Institute Dialogue on Public Libraries and the Colorado State Library released a report in 2018 on how communities can more effectively use libraries to improve and enhance the lives of their residents. The report unveils a set of opportunities and recommendations for building library partnerships statewide that include participation in new youth initiatives, workforce readiness, and libraries serving as civic hubs.

- Provide an array of learning resources and support for people to change career paths.
- Look at education and lifelong learning as one interrelated ecosystem.
- Bring a variety of community resources, including health and human services, into libraries to support students and their families and to close achievement and other gaps.
- Emphasize collective impact strategies in partnership with public and private sectors.
- Connect libraries with the creative community to build on the positive impact of Colorado's creative community on local economies and community development.
- Build leadership networks with the private sector.
- Create a new office in the state to facilitate public-private/public-public partnerships ("P3 czar").
- Establish libraries as a center for conversation and community connections.
- Attract, inspire and enable diverse talent in the library and the community.
- Change the culture and policies that inhibit innovation.

Bill Introduced to Colorado Legislature—Direct Elections of Library Board in Library Districts

Under current law, library district trustees are appointed directly by a committee appointed by the legislative bodies of the governmental units that established the library district. The bill allows the registered voters within a library district's service area to determine by vote whether their library district trustees should be elected. The bill also sets out how library district trustees would be elected, the length of their terms, and how they could be removed.



OLD TOWN LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS

- Monique hosted a bilingual storytime for the Parents and Children Together (PACT) initiative in Fort Collins. Children of all ages read, sang and played with musical instruments. She was invited to attend a community engagement event at The Family Center/La Familia to share a bilingual storytime with families. Both were great events that helped promote early literacy in Spanish and English.
- Children's staff attended a Youth Services Workshop at Harmony Library. They brainstormed ideas for Summer Reading programming and activities that involve STREAM elements. The group is buzzing with new ideas to implement throughout the year.
- Ian is in the final stages of writing procedures and finalizing plans for a Seed Library. He is preparing a system for donated seeds to be collected, labeled and made available to the public. He is scheduling programs to promote the Seed Library and support the community in learning best practices to sustain a public Seed Library.

- Erin L.'s LEGO Build Club hosted over 45 parents, grandparents, caregivers and children working together to build LEGO inventions. At the STREAM stations, children learned about building stable structures using marshmallows, gumdrops, and spaghetti. LEGO cars were powered using balloons and children redesigned their cars over and over to see how they could get the cars to zoom faster. A light painting app on the iPad allowed kids to video their LEGO build and add sparkles, firecrackers, and glow lights. And the Ozobots were out, creating an intersection between art and technology; children drew pictures on paper in different colored markers and the mini-bots tracked the lines, turning LED colors as the sensors rolled over the artwork. There was a happy buzz in the room and it was a great program to bring all ages together for STREAM fun.
- Early Literacy Librarian Vicky H. has been the library's representative on the Early Childhood Council Advisory Group for many years. Over the past year, the group has been working on a cultural consciousness series with in depth exploration on topics such as Gender Identity, Sexual Orientation and Race and Racism. Vicky developed booklists of library resources for children, parents and caregivers on these topics and shared them along with examples at the council meetings in her early literacy moments.
- The OTL Conversations in English group wrapped up its year with an end of year holiday gathering with participants from South Korea, Puerto Rico, Libya, Romania, Indonesia, Mexico and Venezuela. Jewel attended the final gathering in support of our wonderful volunteer facilitator, Anne Millions.
- Kristen D. continued her work with drop in coding, the Spectrum Club book group, and the Learning Org team.
