Safe Workplace Handbook

Library staff members have been creating a Safe Workplace Handbook. This Handbook is to be used as a recommended practice guideline and is developed in consultation with the Larimer County Department of Health and Environment, and State of Colorado, Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and World Health Organization (WHO) recommendations. Face Mask Making at Senior Center

The Poudre River Public Library District received 300 masks from a group of volunteers making face masks at the Senior Center.

A group of volunteers have created what they're calling the first "sew safe site" in the nation, a grassroots effort to produce hundreds of masks for those on the front lines.

"It feels good to be doing something positive," organizer Tina Olson said. "And when we see our tally board that shows how many hundreds of masks every day we're making, that is just extra motivation." Olson says they've created more than 3,000 masks, which are going to police officers, firefighters, and essential workers in Fort Collins. COUNCIL TREE LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS

Work from home continued in April. Council Tree Lead staff, including Childrens’ Services Librarian Amy Holzworth, Circulation Supervisor Angela James, Services Librarian Jenny Thurman, and I continued work from home in April. On average, we are maintaining between 70-90% of our regular work time. Our work includes

- Planning programs and services for phased re-opening levels
 - Summer reading challenge (SRC) logistics including prizes, incentive programs (including “Reading Makes Cents”, a new read-to-help others program)
 - Creating a dynamic framework to recommend protocols, training, supplies and staffing levels needed for phased building re-opening
 - Providing recommendations to ELT about materials availability and quarantine protocols
 - Planning alternate districtwide storytimes and programs for June-August
 - Providing a proposal for limited public-access printing and holds-pick-up service
 - Creating alternative ideas for virtual SRC programs to engage children and teens.
 - Providing children’s staff a guide for creating story videos
 - Formation of phone reference service including connectivity and staff training
- Meeting via MSTeams and Zoom with colleagues and staff to share ideas, questions, updates and proposals. Delegated tasks and approved work with staff.
- Research and learning from online webinars, websites and articles and reports

- Updating and adding new content to summer reading, Teen and Kids websites
- Creating guidelines for staff on the updated, online SRC process
- Facilitating a live video discussion for LLT on *Palaces for the People* by Eric Klinenberg
- Building walk-thru to check for roof leaks after snow storm
- Increased purchasing of Overdrive Teen titles to meet the new, decreased holds ratio of one hold to four titles. The pre-closure ratio was one to seven.
- Rearranged May Rekindle the Classics book discussion program to Zoom virtual platform
